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ABOUT GCD

The New Mexico Governor's Commission on Disability (GCD) is committed to improving the quality of life of all New Mexicans with disabilities by addressing social integration, economic self-sufficiency, political resolve, physical and program accessibility, and full participation in the benefits of life and rights of all individuals. GCD addresses physical, sensory, programmatic, and attitudinal barriers to forward its mission. Such barriers may keep a person with a disability from enjoying the full aspects of community living.

GCD works to improve the quality of life of New Mexicans with disabilities through progressive systems advocacy.

GCD promotes community living and access to: employment opportunities; universal access to information; appropriate and available assistive technology; accessible education; accessible, affordable, universally designed housing; accessible and available transportation (rural and urban); available home and community-based services; and access to social and recreational settings.

GCD serves as liaison and advisor to the Governor and Legislature on disability issues. GCD programs include: Disability Awareness and Advocacy Program Physical Accessibility Unit New Mexico Technology Assistance Program Brain Injury Advisory Council



AWARENESS & ADVOCACY

The Quality of Life Grants for fiscal year 2024 have been announced. Five programs have been funded this year, and all have submitted impressive proposals for exiting projects. If you know of any New Mexico nonprofit organizations please encourage them to apply for next year's QOL grant, which will open in April of 2024.

Healing America's Heroes received a grant to expand their veterans' therapeutic recreation programs. HAH holds one session for men and one for women and Cis expanding the number of participant spots and also expanding the program to include first responders in addition to the veterans that have been supported thus far.

Collins Lake Autism Center is expanding their Sensory Integration Therapy program by adding new equipment to their existing playground.

The Ability Center is expanding their ENABLE program. They will distribute 20 window air conditioners and 60 smoke/carbon monoxide detectors to people with disabilities in the Las Cruces area. They will also develop and implement basic computer literacy classes and resources and provide weekly opportunities for social interaction through virtual meet-ups.

Explora is expanding access to its exhibits by undertaking the "Improving Explora Field Trips for Visually Impaired Students" program. Among other inclusive efforts, they will improve accessibility of exhibits to blind and low-vision audiences using industry standards for accessible exhibits and graphics.

Velo Cruces is expanding their program to distribute at least 5 adaptive bicycles to disabled residents of Dona Ana County, host a Bike Safety Rodeo, and host a Reduce the Carbon Footprint Ride and parade to include adaptive cycle recipients and the entire community.

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PHYSICAL ACCESSIBILITY UNIT

Currently GCD is moving forward with our Residential Accessibility Modification Program (RAMP) with new staff members Nadine Flores, RAMP Program Manager, and Annette Apodaca, Disability Specialist/Project Manager. Nadine and Annette handle calls from consumers, inform and assist with applications from potential consumers and prepare for the latter phases of the RAMP process. Some of the phases of RAMP projects include application approvals, approved consumer home site visits, individual project design solutions, drawings and contract documents, consumer approvals, bidding with contractors, writing memorandums, awarding projects, applying for Purchase Orders, Notice to Proceed, pre-construction meetings, project final inspections, invoicing and payment to contractors, follow up warranty inspections, etc. A few physical accessibility inspections have been conducted including a Conservation Trust Homestead Accessible Trail project near Lamy which will provide not just a wheelchair accessible trail but a better experience for everyone inclusive of diverse users. GCD will be conducting an accessibility inspection at offices for Public Education, and recently inspected the Folk Art Museum.

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BRAIN INJURY ADVISORY COUNCIL (BIAC)

The Brain Injury Advisory Council (BIAC) Program has experienced a transition this past spring. Monica Montoya has stepped down from her role as the BIAC coordinator. A position that she held for the last 7 years. We want to thank her for the tremendous work that she has done for the Brain Injury Community. She was instrumental in producing collaboration with several school systems throughout the state, presenting information on prevention of brain injuries to children in all grades from pre-school to seniors in high school.

The helmet distribution program has a wide distribution list, thanks to Monica, to several schools and partners in the field of brain injuries. This will increase the prevention of brain injuries on growing brains of the children who use bicycles, scooters, skateboards, rollerblades and more. In addition, Monica has created opportunities for expansion within the Brain Injury Community by collaborating with the Brain Injury Alliance of NM and the University of New Mexico. This expansion of videos regarding strokes, TBI (Traumatic Brain Injury), events like bike rodeos, materials on Brain Injuries in general were developed and trainings to educators, health workers and domestic violence support workers.

Finally, I want to mention the work of collaborating with the Museum of Natural History on an exhibit on the brain. Monica was instrumental in making this exhibit be as comprehensive, inclusive, informative, engaging, and exciting for the public to obtain awareness on all things related to the brain, including what happens to your brain if you have a brain injury. I believe this exhibit has reached a segment of our society that has not received information related to the work of the BIAC program, and Monica raised that awareness in a more visible way.

We have a new BIAC coordinator, Emily Stern, and she will start on July 24th.I want to welcome Emily to her new position with us here at the NM Governor's Commission on Disability. She comes from the Santa Fe Community College as a professor of English and is a person with a brain injury which she experienced in a bicycle accident. I look forward to the work ahead to continue to have the BIAC program be as engaging, informative and collaborative with our partners statewide on prevention of brain injuries and to expand services that will support individuals with brain injuries of all ages, statewide.

There will be ATrelated educational sessions associated to school, employment, and community engagement. TECH CORNER



TAP Wearable Keyboard

The Tap Strap 2 is a single handed all-inone wearable keyboard and mouse that allows the user to type by simply tapping their fingers on any surface. It can be used on either the right or left hand, is Bluetooth capable, and can be used on your phone, tablets, or computers that have Bluetooth turned on. The device can be used for up to 10 hours on a full charge and comes with a charging case for convenient charging onthe-go. Users can download companion apps to help with learning to type letters, numbers, and symbols with the Tap Strap 2. The apps are free and available on both the App Store and the Google Play Store. The Tap Strap 2 is capable of more advanced features including AirMouse Mode, Controller Mode, and Custom Mode. In AirMouse Mode users can use "AirGestures" with their hand to control their tablet, phone, or computer's mouse functions.

In Controller Mode, users can turn complex commands into simple finger taps. In Custom Mode users customize the Tap Strap to fit their needs.

This one-handed keyboard and mouse can be good for individuals who may have limited motor control in one hand or for anyone who needs an alternative keyboard for typing on-the-go, alternative controls for gaming, or to create custom controls for your device.

PERSONAL STORIES

In April 2023, the New Mexico Technology Assistance Program (NMTAP) received a call from one of our former NMTAP Council members requesting that we offer our services to a friend who was struggling to communicate due to a recent surgery that left him 100% vocally impaired. With the friend's permission, NMTAP contacted him and asked him if he'd like to come in to look at some Assistive Technology (AT) tools that could allow him to speak with the help of text-tospeech software. Thankfully, this gentleman took NMTAP up on the offer and now, three months later, much progress has been made. To date, our new consumer has successfully found AT to help him



communicate, and that AT consists of an iPad with a keyboard and case, and the application Proloquo4text.

With Proloquo4text, this man can quickly type out messages in the App, and then those words are spoken aloud. This has helped him not only in social situations, but also in working toward his new goals, which include finding employment with the help of the New Mexico Division of Vocational Rehabilitation (NMDVR.) In addition to discussing NMDVR with our consumer, we also connected him with the New Mexico Commission for Deaf and Hard of Hearing's Telecommunications Equipment Distribution Program and with Adelante's DiverseIT program, which provides computers for people with disabilities, often free of charge.

While more progress is to be made, the experience between NMTAP and this consumer has been monumental! Not only has this consumer found AT for his needs, but this process also highlights a great cross-collaboration between disability service providers whose goal is to help folks not only in their daily lives, but in employment and education. Please remember NMTAP's services the next time you or a loved one is feeling like there must be a tool or resource available to help with a disability. It is truly our pleasure to help New Mexicans!

Introducing New Staff

The Brain Injury Advisory Council (BIAC) Program has experienced a transition this past spring. Monica Montoya has stepped down from her role as the BIAC coordinator that she held for the last 7 years. We want to thank her for the tremendous work that she has done for the Brain Injury Community. We have a new BIAC coordinator, Emily Stern, and she will start on July 24th.

I am a teacher, writer, visual and performing artist, and equity and leadership consultant, originally from the Southside of Chicago. I have over 30 years of coordinating and managing programs and people and designing, implementing, and teaching justicecentered curricula. I've lived in Santa Fe since 2008. My professional path began in 1993 at Purdue University when I first used storytelling and an intersectional analysis for AIDS education & prevention workshops after my mother's death from complications of AIDS that same year. As a brain injury survivor and person with a disability, I bring additional passion and

experience to BIAC. Working specifically on disability justice and brain injury prevention, advocacy, and support will allow me to blend my lived experiences with my vocational training, academic studies, and work experiences. I'm a survivor of multiple brain injuries, all of which occurred in New Mexico. The first was a 2009 hit-and-run at St. Francis and Cerrillos while riding my bicycle. Thankfully, I was wearing a helmet. For this reason, coordinating and supporting widespread helmet use for New Mexicans is a personal and profound honor.

I founded <u>Intersectional Consulting</u>, where I've worked with municipal leaders and entities, institutions, organizations, and businesses to embody a justice-centered and informed intersectional lens. The last 13 years, I've spent most of my time at The Santa Fe

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Community College (SFCC). I have woven my active commitment to students, advocacy, policy reform, universal design, and antiracist, trauma-informed teaching and learning into all areas of my work, including spearheading the creation and coordination of The Center for Diversity and Integrated Learning, its Advisory Council, and professional development program The Culture, Justice, and Learning Institute. I was a contributing faculty member and equity consultant at The Institute of American Indian Arts for ten years.

I was honored to create the art for the letter "U" in Bay area Disability Justice performance project <u>Sins Invalid's</u> Disability Justice from A to Z Coloring Book. I have an M.F.A from Vermont's Goddard College in Creative Nonfiction with a critical emphasis on women and AIDS in literature, and a BA from the Evergreen State College in Washington State. In my spare time, I like to hang with my daughter, cats, friends; and show and sell art at the Santa Fe Railyard Artisan's Market. I look for ward to the work ahead to continue to have the BIAC program be as engaging, informative and collaborative with our partners statewide on prevention of brain injuries and to expand services that will support individuals with brain injuries of all ages, statewide.
